Amazing things happen in the hands of these masters of their trades; leather work; upholstery; jewellery; woodwork; metalwork; ceramics; paintings; clocks; you name it and they will fix it. The BBC says the show is an 'antidote to throwaway culture.'

As we begin a New Year what are we looking forward to being restored?

- Restoration of health for all who are ill, either with Covid-19, other illnesses or with mental health issues.
- Restoration of an economy so burdened with debt.
- Restoration of jobs for those who have lost them this year along with thousands of others.
- Restoration of life as we know it!

We have just celebrated the coming to earth of God's son, Jesus, as a baby. When he began his ministry as an adult he quoted Isaiah, an Old Testament prophet, by saying, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" (Luke 4:18).

The EU (ecological union) we haven't left

It's said that if you add together all the gardens in Britain you would have an area greater than that of Suffolk. So those of us fortunate enough to have had a garden during the long periods we have been 'locked down' in 2020 can be said to have jointly enjoyed the pleasures of a rural county. Although large parts of Kent are still considered rural, they may not feel like it sometimes: even if not hemmed-in by thousands of new houses, few are free from the additional road traffic generated – and that's before we add many thousands of temporarily stranded lorries.

But wherever they are, it can only be a few gardens that are not used by birds, especially if food is provided for them. Ironically, probably the most frequent species to be found in gardens now (and certainly the most easily seen) is the one most commonly considered to be a farmland bird – the woodpigeon. One of the few birds to have benefitted from industrial-scale arable farming, its numbers have swelled in step with the increase in oilseed rape. As vegetable gardeners will readily attest, woodpigeons are partial to the foliage of plants in the cabbage family – and that includes rape. So as this crop has expanded, so has the woodpigeon population.

At the other end of the garden bird scale, the diminutive wren still holds sway as the most common — in terms of being found in the greatest variety of locations - from sea-level to mountainous areas. Also possibly the loudest, certainly for its size, this tiny seeker-of-cavities for its nest bears a scientific name to match the habit: *Troglodytes*, the cave-dweller.

Both are resident in the UK, but are joined throughout the year by species like redwing and fieldfare seeking for relief from the harsh northern European winter, or chiffchaff and swallow that view our summers as perfect for raising young and, in the case of the latter, are prepared to cross half the world to get here.

Other species' numbers are increased in the winter as their continental counterparts join them for the UK's milder weather and, it has to be said, for the life-saving food generously provided by householders. Should it be possible, an eaves-dropped conversation overheard between blackbirds, thrushes, chaffinches or robins, to name just a few species, would be enriched with Scandinavian, Polish, Dutch and even Russian accents - demonstrating that even if we are no longer politically entwined with Europe, we cannot escape our ecological interdependence.

Something to reflect on in a locked-down January.

• It was stated that there is an increase in the report of "undesirable" characters acting suspiciously in the area & surrounding villages. It was noted that people should be aware of security, especially at this time of year.

• CONTINUED.....

- **Speedwatch** is still "on hold" because of COVID restrictions and safety concerns for volunteers. A repeat Traffic Survey has been requested but no reply has been received yet. Police have been asked for extra support/speed checks around the village.
- It was agreed to defer the Lorry Watch Scheme" in Dean Street until after Christmas.
- **Highways:** Gullies around the village need attention and this has been reported to Highways and EFPC contractors (Pearsons) asked to check when carrying out their regular works. It was further agreed to write to Highways to request more "Unsuitable for HGV's" signage at appropriate places in the village.
- **Vegetation/tree/hedge overgrowth**: Residents are reminded that <u>if the overgrowth stems from the landowner's property</u>, it is their responsibility to cut back the overgrowth so that public pathways/highways are kept clear.
- It was AGREED to continue with the "**Diffusion Tubes**" under the MBC Air Pollution Monitoring scheme for another year.
- The Parish Council Communications Working Party have recommended a new Website Host (NETWISE) and it was AGREED to forge ahead as the new Website needs to be in place by the end of March 2021.
- **Parish Council Recreation Ground:** Replacement trees have been ordered and Treecycle Ltd have been given approval to deal with an overhanging branch.
- Parish Car Park: New saplings have been planted to fill the gaps in the hedge and it was AGREED that Pearson's are to cut the current hedge growth, as necessary.
- **Fete Committee/Christmas Tree:** This will be going into the Church Yard as usual but there will be no "switching on" event this year. The Christmas Tree is funded by the Fete Committee money. The Parish Council wished to express thanks to the Fete Committee regards arrangements for the village Christmas Tree again this year.
